

# CULTURAL & CREATIVE PRACTICE SURVEY



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### INTRODUCTION

This report outlines the findings from a survey carried out by Arts Council Malta and the National Statistics Office into the creative, cultural and artistic practice in Malta. This survey is an initial step in mapping the working conditions of artistic, creative and cultural practitioners in Malta, and in developing a more holistic understanding of the challenges these practitioners face in their practice.

This study is driven by ACM's committment to champion the advancement of the status of artists and creative & cultural practitioners, as stated in Strategy 2025. This data supports ACM's work in furthering the professional development of the creative sector through the development and implementation of policy addressing the structural and practical challenges identified through this research.

This survey was carried out in November 2019, shortly before the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and the disruptions in social, cultural and artistic life that came with it. The findings are being published now as they present a valuable snapshot of the conditions under which artistic, creative and cultural practitioners operated prior to the changes brought about by the pandemic, as well as the attitudes, desires and self-perception of practitioners. Subsequent follow-up studies will be crucial in assessing the degree to which the sector has returned to the pre-pandemic reality outlined in this report, as well as to understanding the changes in the ways creative & cultural practitioners have come to operate.

### METHODOLOGICAL NOTE

### **COVERAGE AND RESPONSE**

The target population for this survey consisted of all persons aged 16 years and over, living in private households in Malta. A total of 425,698 persons were eligible to participate in the survey. Table 1 and Table 2 below illustrate the distribution of persons by sex and age group and the distribution of persons by sex and district.

A stratified random sampling process (without replacement) was employed for this survey. This probability sampling method entails the partitioning of the population into mutually exclusive subgroups, and an independent (simple) random sample is selected from each of these sub-groups to ensure a uniform distribution of the sample relative to a number of pre-selected characteristics of the population. In this case, sub-groups were constructed relative to sex, age group and district.

In addition to this, quotas were used throughout the data collection phase to ensure that the required number of persons from each sub-group is selected. The main advantage of using quotas is to ensure that an adequate number of units are sampled from every sub-group, even in very small ones for which the probability of selection is relatively small compared to other groups. Since the mechanism of selecting persons was made in a random manner, no significant bias is introduced by applying such quotas.

A total of 2,375 persons were contacted for this survey where 1,019 participated, while another 1,244 persons were not eligible to participate. Ineligible cases take into account 839 persons who were contacted at least once to no avail and were eventually not contacted again due to exhausted quotas.

This resulted in a net effective response rate of 90.1%. Table 3 below shows the distribution of the gross sample by type of response:

### **DATA COLLECTION**

Data was collected by means of Computer Assisted Telephone Interview (CATI) between 30th September and 12th October 2019. In CATI, although respondents are contacted by telephone, computers are used to enter the data obtained from respondents during the interview. In addition, another important aspect of CATI surveys is that each sampling unit is randomly assigned among interviewers, and hence reduces interviewer bias to a bare minimum.

### **QUALITY CONTROL**

A series of measures were implemented to certify that optimum quality was achieved in this survey. These consisted of quality checks and in-built validation rules in the data collection program to limit the occurrence of non-sampling errors. The data-entry program had a number of in-built validations so that skip patterns are executed exactly as intended while responses are within a specific range. In addition, constant supervision during the data collection stage ensured a harmonised data collection process.

Missing data are often a problem in surveys, arising when sampled units do not respond to a particular question. A technique known as 'imputation' was used whereby missing values were filled in to create a complete dataset that can then be analysed to the full. A Hot-deck imputation method was used. Observations were grouped according to relevant demographics and other questions. The mode of the respective category was then taken as the imputed value.

The dataset was further subject to a series of other checks during the data-editing stage in order to identify any remaining incorrect or logically misleading data.

### WEIGHTING OF RESULTS

Survey data was weighted to correct for any biases present in the final sample of participating units arising from different response rates observed in different categories. This served to align and grossup sample estimates with the benchmark distribution in terms of sex, age group, and district.

### **ERRORS**

The survey was subject to two main sources of errors, technically referred to as Sampling and Non-Sampling errors. While the errors attributed to each quantity estimated from the sample may be calculated, care must be taken when comparing such estimated figures with the population.

Of particular interest is the margin of error, which constitutes sampling error. The margin of error quantifies uncertainty about a survey result and expresses the amount of sampling error in a survey's results. This is normally associated with a statistical level of confidence in such a way as to make it possible to calculate confidence intervals of the form estimate ± margin of error. Consequently, the relative margin of error is simply the margin of error expressed as a percentage of the quantity to which it refers.

Table 6 below illustrates estimates of precision for a range of derived percentage rates (p) and the corresponding (weighted) number of persons (N) over which the rates are computed.

For example, the percentage of persons who did not practice any cultural, creative and/or artistic activities during the 12 months preceding the survey stood at 72.2%. This is calculated out of the total number of 425,698 eligible persons. In this case, if a precise calculation is carried out, the margin of error equals 2.75%. From the table above this may be estimated using data for p=70. In this case the margin of error equals 2.8%\*. Thus, if the estimated value is considered, the 95% confidence interval is the range 69.4% to 75.0%, i.e.  $72.2\% \pm 2.8\%$ .

It must be emphasised that figures based on a relative margin of error of 30% or more or which are calculated on a small number of reporting persons (for example 30 or less) must be treated with caution as they may not be statistically representative due to a large percentage of error assigned. These occurrences are shaded in the table above.


### Section 1 - Cultural, Creative & Artistic Practice

The total number of persons who practised *at least one* cultural, creative and artistic activity during the twelve months prior to the data collection, was estimated to stand at 118,557. This translates to 27.9% of the total population. Such cultural, creative and artistic activities included not just the visual arts, music, dance, but also crafts, creative computing, creative writing and other activities.

48.7% of these were males and almost half (48.1%) of the persons practising cultural, creative and artistic activities were between 16 to 34 years of age. 53.7% of males who practiced an activity were aged 16 to 34, compared to 42.7% of females. Accordingly, when we only take this particular age group into account, we find that, in absolute numbers, there were more males (31,022) than females (25,948) practising *at least one* cultural, creative and artistic activity.



### Distribution of the practice of cultural, creative & artistic activities in the total population



The majority of these cultural practitioners (63.1%) practised these cultural, creative and artistic activities on their own rather than as part of an organisation. Males (64.5%) and females (61.7%) were nearly equally likely to practise on their own. This pattern of near-equality between the rates of males and females was also found to be consistent for other forms of practice (e.g. practising as part of a private or voluntary organisation). The exception to this are those cultural practitioners practising on behalf of a public organisation, where out of a total of 5.1% practising within this setting, 90.9% were females and only 9.1% were males.

The relative majority, or 29.6%, of the persons who practised *at least one* cultural, creative and artistic activity were resident in the Northern Harbour district. Almost two in every three (63%) of these were males.

Just over half, or 54.6%, of cultural practitioners were in paid employment, regardless of whether or not this employment was related to their creative practice (Table 1.1). Female cultural practitioners were 12.3 percentage points less likely to be in paid employment when compared to their male counterparts.



Chart 1.1. Profile of persons who practised at least one activity in the past 12 months by sex and age group



Chart 1.2 presents a breakdown of the forms of artistic practice by type. The most widespread form of practice is crafts, with almost a quarter (22.5%) of practicing respondents engaging in this practice. Other forms of practice showed lower levels of popularity, with playing a musical instrument (13.7%), creative computing (12.9%), visual arts (12.5%) and photography (11.6%) all showing similar levels of popularity to one another.

Chart 1.2. Distribution of cultural, creative & artistic activities practised by type (%)



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Table 1.2 refers to the average hours per week spent on creative activity and employment by persons who were in employment and who also happened to be practising *at least one* cultural, creative and artistic activity. Persons who were employed spent an average of 10.2 hours per week on cultural, creative and artistic activity during the twelve months prior to the survey, while spending on average 40.1 hours per week in their paid employment. With specific reference to those employed in cultural, creative and artistic activities, these persons were estimated to have spent an average of 8 hours per week practising creative activity as part of their paid employment (Table 1.2 and chart 1.3).



The survey also revealed that two in three persons who received tuition and/or certificates in cultural, creative & artistic activities have a post - secondary or tertiary level of education. This level of educational attainment pertains to most of the forms of practice listed, except for crafts and acting on stage or in film. Persons who practice in these two fields are more likely to have a secondary level of education.

Of all the cultural practitioners, persons who play a musical instrument were the ones who were most likely to concomitantly have tuition and/or certificates in their activity and have completed (any) tertiary education (Table 1.3).

In total, only 15.9% of those who practised *at least one* cultural, creative and artistic activity spent some hours of *paid* employment on such activities during the twelve months prior to the survey (Table 1.4).

Cultural practitioners in visual arts and those who practiced singing spent 11.8 hours per week on average on these activities; while their counterparts acting on stage or in a film spent an average of 2.9 hours per week (Table 1.2).

Persons playing a musical instrument stood out as the type of cultural practitioners that were most willing to increase their practising hours, indicating that they were willing to increase their time from an estimated 3.7 to 12.3 hours per week (Table 1.5).

When asked whether they had practised cultural, creative and artistic activities in the past, most cultural practitioners were found to practised the same activity even before the twelve-month period prior to the survey. Creative computing emerged as the second most practised activity before the twelve-month period prior to the survey. Creative computing was most prominently also practised by those who stated that they now practise film-making, crafts and visual arts. Singing was the second most practised activity amongst those now practising dance, while playing a musical instrument was the second most common activity for those practising photography and singing (Table 1.6).

Table 1.7 shows how of all the cultural, creative & artistic activities, filmmaking had the largest share of practitioners who spend €1,000 or more on their practice, with 31.3%. It was also the activity which proportionally has the largest share of practitioners to have a revenue of €1,000 or more from their practice, with 40.7%.

On the other hand, playing a musical instrument or practising crafts appear to be the activities which drew the highest share of respondents within their own categories whose spending falls within the lowest expenditure category of €0-499. These two activities were also the ones whose practitioners fell mostly in the lowest category when it came to income derived from their practice (Table 1.7).

Just under half, or 45.4%, of persons practising *at least one* cultural, creative & artistic activity considered themselves to be artists. When this is disaggregated by the various activities, we observe that this varies from 73.9% of persons in the visual arts to 36.5% of persons in filmmaking.

In total, only 13.2% of persons practising *at least one* cultural, creative & artistic activity agreed with the statement that they 'make a living from artistic, cultural and creative practice'. Persons engaged in filmmaking are the ones who were relatively more likely to make a living out of such activity. Again, persons practising filmmaking are the category which were relatively more likely to have income from their cultural practice.

Overall, only 18.8% of persons practising *at least one* cultural, creative & artistic activity said that they make some income from artistic, cultural and creative practice (Table 1.8).



On a scale from one to ten where one means 'very dissatisfied' and ten means 'very satisfied', the life satisfaction of those persons practising at least one cultural, creative & artistic activity stood at 7.9. Except for creative computing and acting on stage or in film, the life satisfaction of persons practising any activity was equal or slightly higher than those not doing it (Table 1.9 & Chart 1.3). Persons practising crafts (8.0), dance (8.0), creative writing (8.1), filmmaking (8.1) and acting on stage or in film (8.2) were the ones which indicated the highest levels of life satisfaction.

### Section 2 – Employment, Time & Financial Considerations

In the twelve months prior to October 2019, 96,403 persons in (any) employment practised at least one cultural, creative & artistic activities. Persons in the three major groups of occupations, namely professionals (27.1%), technicians and associate professionals (21.6%), and service and sales workers (15.1%), were also the ones who were most likely to practise cultural, creative & artistic activities.

Plant and machine operators and assemblers and persons in elementary occupations were the least likely to engage in cultural, creative & artistic activities. In general, the first activity practised by employed persons is crafts, with 18.2% practising this activity. On the other hand, dance, filmmaking, and acting on stage or in film are the three cultural, creative & artistic activities that were least practised by persons in employment (Table 2.1 and Chart 2.1).



Filmmaking was the most time-consuming cultural, creative & artistic activity, with practitioners dedicating an average of 13 hours per week on this form of activity.

Persons in visual arts spent an average of 8.6 hours per week of practice, while persons acting on stage or in film spent an average of 3.4 hours per week. Persons who practise singing spent an average of 7 hours per week of practice, while persons involved in dance spent an average of 3.3 hours per week (Table 2.2 and Chart 2.2).

Creative writing and visual arts are the activities for which their practitioners incurred most of the related expenses out of their own pockets. On the other hand, acting on stage or in film was the activity that was the most financially rewarding, when we consider the percentage share of respondents who agreed with this statement (Table 2.2 and Chart 2.3).

Chart 2.2. Share of persons practising at least one cultural, creative & artistic activity during the twelve months prior to the survey by employment status and type of cultural activity







Chart 2.3. Share of persons practising at least one cultural, creative & artistic activity during the twelve months prior to the survey by type of financial support




A large share of cultural practitioners were independent practitioners, with a total of 63% not practising within the context of an organisation. 18% practise within the context of a private organisation, while a further 5% practise within a public sector organisation. The remaining 14% of practitioners stated that they practise within the context of a voluntary organisation.

Persons who practised independently (i.e. not within the context of an organisation) were found to be the least likely to also be in employment related to their practice, at only 7.1% On the other hand, those who practised on behalf of a private organisation were the most likely to be in paid employment related to their practice, at 36% (Table 2.3 and Chart 2.4).

## Section 3 – Range of Practice

Of all the art forms practised in the twelve months prior to the survey, crafts was the activity most widely practised by persons with a tertiary education. Dancers and musicians were the artists most likely to have had tuition and/or received certificates in their artistic field at the rates of 90.1% and 70.0% respectively (Table 3.1).

Table 3.2 shows that the most common roles in the arts for persons having tuition/certificates in cultural, creative & artistic activities were those as a creator or performer. Likewise, 'creating' was the primary role for persons with tuition and/certificates in crafts (85.6%); creative writing (83.8%); creative computing (79.5%); visual arts (64.9%); photography (50.9%); and, playing a musical instrument (47.6%). On the other hand, the role of 'performing' was more important for persons with tuition and/or certificates in dance (71.6%); singing (65.7%); filmmaking (41.9%); and, acting on stage or in film (40.4%) (Table 3.2).



Persons having tuition/certificates in filmmaking and creative computing are the most likely to gain income from their practice. Most of this income derived from filmmaking and creative computing fell within the €1,000+ income bracket in the twelve months prior to the survey. On the other hand, persons having tuition/certificates in dance and musical instruments are the least likely to gain income from their practice (Table 3.3).

# Section 4 - Perceptions & Attitudes

Persons practising visual arts and persons practising dance in the twelve months prior to the survey, were the most likely to consider themselves as artists. Accordingly, when they were asked whether they agree with the statement 'You consider yourself to be an artist', 73.9% of the former and 67.9% of the latter agreed (Table 4.1).

When the creative practitioners were asked whether they 'make a living from artistic, cultural and creative practice', persons in filmmaking were the mostly likely to agree (37.8%), followed by persons in creative computing who came second (24.4%). These two categories were also the ones most in agreement with the statement that they 'intend to make a living from art/cultural and creative practice' at the rates of 49.1% and 39.6% respectively.

Persons acting on stage or in film (43.3%) and singers (38.0%) were the most likely to 'belong to an artistic, creative or cultural organisation'. On the other hand, persons acting on stage or in film were the mostly likely to agree with the statement that they are 'recognised by the general public for their practice' (Table 4.1).

Chart 4.1: Persons practising cultural, creative & artistic activities by agreement with the statement: 'You make a living from artistic, cultural and creative practice'




Table 4.2 represents the variation of the creative pratitioners' perceptions with respect to further statements. Accordingly, it is made known that persons practising musical instruments are the most likely to 'strongly disagree' with the statement that 'in their primary employment, they use artistic or creative skills'.

Persons doing crafts were the most to 'strongly disagree' with the statement that 'financial considerations hinder my involvement in artistic practice'.

Persons practising visual arts were the most to 'strongly disagree' with the statement that 'time constraints hinder their involvement in artistic practice'.

Table 4.3 indicate that artists who practise for a private organisation were nearly twice as likely to consider themselves to be artists than those who practise by themselves with no attachment to any organisation (75.1% as opposed to 39.0%).

Respondents practising on behalf of a private organisation were more likely to agree with the statements saying that 'You make a living from artistic, cultural and creative practice' (40.4%) or 'You make some income from artistic, cultural and creative practice' (50.6%) or 'You intend to make a living from art/cultural and creative practice' (51.4%) than those practising for a public or voluntary organisation or solo artists (Table 4.3).

This report provides a brief glimpse into some of the key findings from the Creative and Cultural Practice Survey, indicating the broad realities faced by creative and cultural practitioners within their regular practice.

This report is being accompanied by the publication of another report, also based upon this study, titled *Artists in Malta: Myth to Method* which explores several other aspects of this data in a more comprehensive manner.

Arts Council Malta intends to revisit this study over the coming years in order to develop a comparative body of data which will support a stronger understanding of how the sector has changed since 2019.




